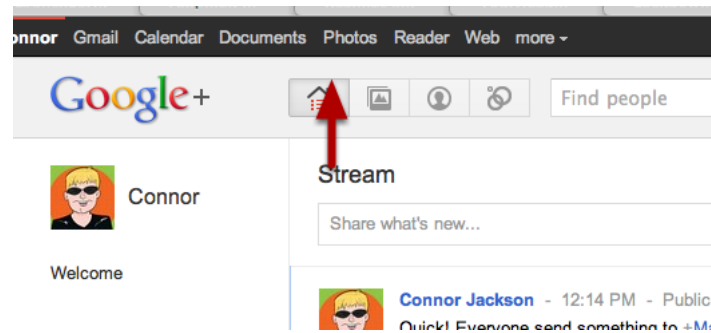
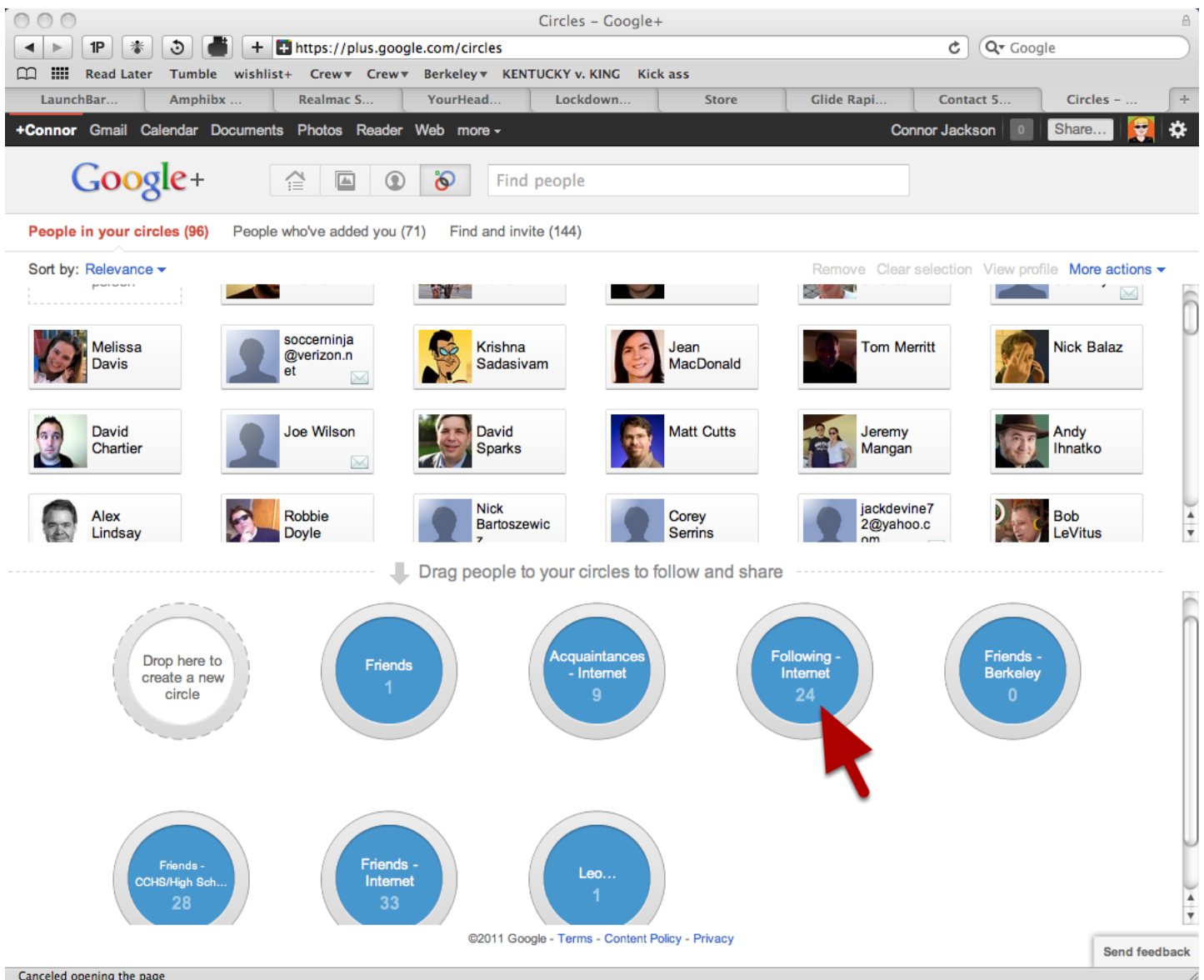


# Putting People from one Google+ Circle into another Circle

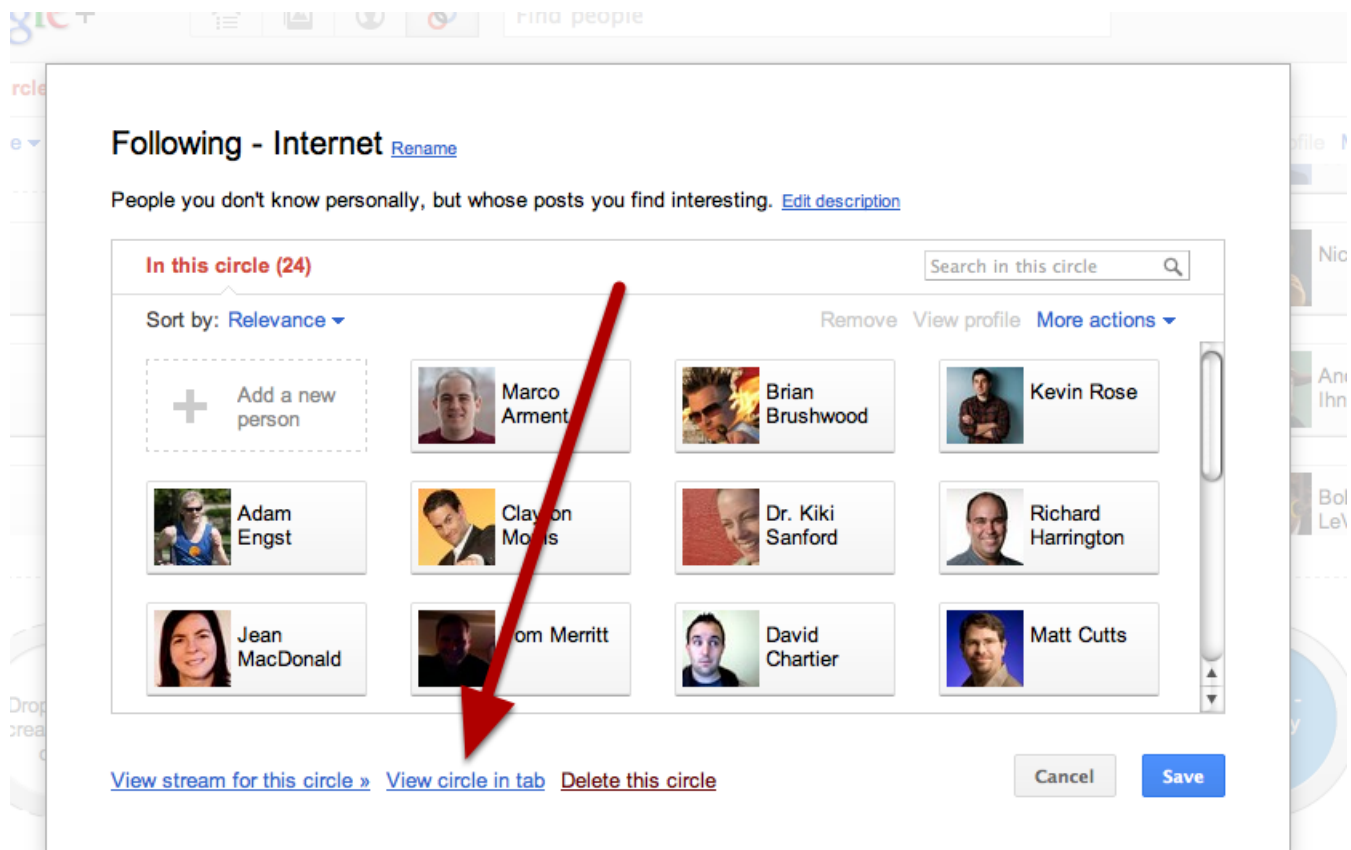
## Open the circles pane
